NALSAR Student Law Review (NSLR) Ethics Policy

The NALSAR Student Law Review (NSLR) is committed to upholding the highest standards of publication ethics. This policy is based on the principles of the Committee on Publication Ethics (COPE) and applies to all members of the Editorial Board, peer reviewers, contributors and authors.

1. Publication Decisions

The NSLR Editorial Board holds sole responsibility for deciding which submissions are published. This decision is guided by the journal's commitment to legal and ethical standards, including those regarding libel, copyright, and plagiarism. The Board will consult with its members and peer reviewers to make informed decisions.

2. Non-Discrimination

Manuscripts will be evaluated on their intellectual merit and content, without any consideration for the author's race, gender, sexual orientation, religious belief, ethnic origin, citizenship, political philosophy or any similar parameter.

3. Confidentiality

All information related to a submitted manuscript, including its content and status, will be kept confidential. This information will not be disclosed to anyone other than the corresponding author(s), reviewers, and the Editorial Board.

4. Privacy

Unpublished materials or ideas shared in a submitted manuscript must not be used by any member of the Editorial Board or peer reviewer in their personal research without the express written consent of the author(s).

5. Acknowledgement of Sources

Authors are required to properly acknowledge and cite all sources they have used. This includes published works, as well as information obtained through private correspondence, conversations, or discussions with third parties, which requires explicit permission from the source.

6. Errors in Published Works

Should an author discover a significant error or inaccuracy in their published work, they are obligated to promptly inform the NSLR Editorial Board. The author must then cooperate with the Board to correct or retract the paper as necessary.

7. Conflict of Interest

All authors, reviewers, and Editorial Board members must disclose any relationships or interests that could be perceived as a conflict of interest. An editor with a potential conflict will recuse themselves from the review process for that manuscript.

8. Plagiarism and Improper Authorship

Submissions are subject to a plagiarism check during the initial evaluation stage. Any instance of plagiarism or improper authorship will result in immediate rejection. Improper authorship includes cases where an individual who did not contribute significantly to the work is listed as an author, or where a contributing author is omitted.

9. Dealing with Unethical Behaviour

Any person can report suspected unethical behaviour to the Editorial Board, provided they offer sufficient evidence for an investigation. All allegations are taken seriously. The Board will contact the author(s) and, after due consideration, may reject the article or, if already published, issue a formal retraction notice.

10. Duplicate Submission

Submitting the same manuscript to multiple journals simultaneously is not permitted. Such submissions will be withdrawn from consideration with immediate notice.
